Pastor's Corner July 2023

Annual Conference in Omaha is always something I look forward to. You see, ministers begin their journey to ordination in a local church. After approval by the local church, candidates go through a few years of interviews, education, background checks, psychological assessments to make sure that folks are competent and fit to serve a local congregation. Once we are ordained as Elder in the United Methodist Church, church membership transfers to the annual conference, instead of a local church. Clergy are appointed by the bishop and cabinet to serve local congregations, but we are set apart from the



congregations we are appointed to serve. Appointments typically are for one year at a time, from July 1-June 30. I am happy to report that I have been reappointed to serve Pleasant Hill UMC for the coming year on a half-time basis. I look forward to working with you in the coming year!

Some of you may be wondering what happens at the Annual conference, and you will be getting a summary of the activity soon. I can give you a brief overview. It is actually a lot like what happens at our local church conference, only on a larger scale. We hear and read reports from agencies that work with the conference...like reports from Saint Paul school of theology, all the conference camps and campus ministries, the board of pensions, etc. We have worship services honoring our deceased clergy and spouses and it is at the annual conference that we ordain clergy. We elect committees and officers and) we approve the budget for the conference, after some education about what all these numerous line items cover. We have a legislative session, where we consider and vote on petitions brought by individuals, local churches, and conference committees. We approve changes in bylaws to our church foundations in Kansas and Nebraska, and ask guestions of conference leadership on a wide range of issues. There are luncheons, dinners, and of course, snacks, because what church meeting can take place without snacks? Surrounding our meeting hall (this year a hotel ballroom) are displays from various folks...individual camps, insurance reps, seminaries, campus ministry, youth ministry and so on. At those tables, you can collect information...a flyer, a button, a pen or notepad, and often, a peppermint or piece of individually wrapped chocolate. Did I mention snacks?

We did have nice padded chairs this year to sit in, and it turns out that even the nicest padded chair can become a bit hard over three and a half days of sitting. The highlight for me is worship services and time to visit with my friends and colleagues.

One of the highlights of this conference this year were moments of great humor. Someone came up with some great "commercials" that were shared here and there in the business sessions, usually right before a break or meal time. They were a lot like commercials on TV and a few light moments make a world of difference!

Next year's conference will be in Kearney, NE, and you are more than welcome to attend either online or in person!

Lay Person Annual Conference Report

Business completed during the Great Plains Annual Conference included voting on the following resolutions.

- Support for creating a geographic regional conference structure that simultaneously holds core doctrinal commitments in common and allows contextual differentiation. *Approved*
- Update guidelines to eliminate conflicts of interest within councils, boards and committees
 which occurs when immediate family members serve where a conference employee is
 accountable. *Approved*
- Increase racial-ethnic clergy and laity in conference leadership on committees, teams, and boards. *Approved*
- Building Bridges, Not Walls that establish recommendations to reduce injustice and inhumanity at the boarders, to take a stance for more humane treatment, and to treat people with dignity and respect. *Approved*
- Extend the deadline for disaffiliation until after the 2024 General Conference. *Failed*

Comments shared by the youth in the Church of 2050 Focus session:

- They want the church to include all people and to love all people.
- They will continue to focus on social justice, activism, and community engagement.
- Thanks to the church of 2023 youth are given the platform to continue to grow these areas of focus as the years progress.
- The youth are not afraid to stand up for what is right and as 2050 grows closer they will have more influence on what is right.
- If the next generation (our elementary and younger children) are pushed away will there be a church in 2050?
- The church of 2023 needs to help create the next group of leaders in order to continue to the church of 2050.
- There has been change in the UMC and many churches are more accepting than they used to be. However, there are still churches where youth don't feel safe or welcomed. There are instances where mental health issues are considered as just teenage drama.
- When this generation of youth take over leadership in the church near 2050, there will be different types of voices in power. The church will grow stronger and with their faith in God, He will give them strength to grow the church and to serve Him.
- They shared messages and shed tears missing their friends who attended last year but are part of disaffiliated churches this year.
- The church will change a lot in 27 years but it will still have all the love, hope and caring it has right now.
- As the church becomes more inclusive there will be an increase of youth and family involvement.
- The church isn't the pastors, it is the people. The church is what is left when the building burns down and the pastor skips town.

Photos taken while in uniform are not required. If you prefer (or cannot find a photo taken while in uniform), you are welcome to submit a photo taken while in civilian clothes.






